2. Academic Details

2.1 Overview of the Subject

This subject analyses tests for language assessment, such as IELTS and TOEFL, and their validity in a range of contexts, to interpret test scores, and to discuss curriculum approaches which use assessment to assist students to learn. The social and ethical dimensions of language testing receive prominent attention. Since the students are at the one time being assessed themselves and preparing to assess others, this unit is one in which they have to 'look both ways'. They have to examine how they react to the different types of assessment and ask themselves how they would use them in their own classrooms. They have to learn to moderate their demands according to the background of the students and the level that is required.

2.2 Graduate Attributes for Postgraduate Courses

Graduates of the *Graduate Certificate of TESOL*, the *Graduate Diploma of TESOL* and the *Master of Arts (TESOL)* courses from King's Own Institute will achieve the graduate attributes expected from successful completion of a Master's degree under the Australian Qualifications Framework (2nd edition, January 2013). 2.5 Teaching Methods/Strategies

Briefly described below are the teaching methods/strategies used in this subject:

- Lectures (2 hours/week) are conducted in seminar style and address the subject content, provide motivation and context and draw on the students' experience and preparatory reading.
- Tutorials (1 hours/week) include class discussion of case studies and research papers, practice sets and problem-solving and syndicate work on group projects. Tutorials often include group exercises and so contribute to the development of teamwork skills and cultural understanding. Tutorial participation is an essential component of the subject and contributes to the development of many of the graduate attributes (see section 2.2 above). Tutorial participation contributes towards the assessment in many subjects (see details in Section 3.1 for this subject). Supplementary tutorial material such as case studies, recommended readings, review questions etc. will be made available each week in Moodle.
- Online teaching resources include class materials, readings, model answers to assignments and exercises and discussion boards. All online materials for this subject as provided by KOI will be found in the Moodle page for this subject. Students should access Moodle regularly as material may be updated at any time during the trimester
- Other contact academic staff may also contact students either via Moodle messaging, or via email to the email address provided to KOI on enrolment.
